

Robert Glennon

Robert Glennon is the Morris K. Udall Professor of Law and Public Policy in the Rogers College of Law at the University of Arizona, where he teaches constitutional law, American legal history, and water law. Glennon's funded research activities have included two National Science Foundation grants. He had held many administrative positions, such as trustee, director, or chair for various institutional organizations. His professional activities include serving as Water Policy Advisor to Pima County, Arizona; as a member of American Rivers' Science and Technical Advisory Committee; and as a commentator and analyst for various television and radio programs.

Glennon is the author of many books, articles, and other writings. His best-known work is *Water Follies: Groundwater Pumping and the Fate of America's Fresh Waters* (Island Press, 2002), the first book ever published to focus on the environmental problems caused by groundwater pumping. Glennon received numerous accolades for *Water Follies* from such publications as *Scientific American*, *The Washington Post*, and *The New York Review of Books*. His new book, *Unquenchable: America's Water Crisis and What We Can Do About It*, will be published in early 2009.

Glennon received a J.D. from Boston College Law School and an M.A. and Ph.D. in American History from Brandeis University. He is also a member of the bars of Arizona and Massachusetts.
