

Thank you for your interest in attending oral arguments before the **Arizona Court of Appeals, Division 2**, at the James E. Rogers College of Law, **Ares Auditorium (Room 164)**, on **Wednesday, October 7, 2009**, from **3:00 – 5:15 p.m.**

Following are key details pertinent to the Court's visit.

#### **Security Protocol and Conduct Guidelines**

- Please arrive early. Doors to the Ares Auditorium will open by 2:30
- Bring the e-ticket sent with your reservation confirmation.

- Each person entering the Ares Auditorium must go through security.

4:00 2CA-SA 2009-0062 STATE OF ARIZONA v. ERICA LEA DAUGHTERS-WHITE, et al.

Issue Summary: Did the respondent judge abuse her discretion in finding the real parties in interest, defendants in consolidated prosecutions for driving with a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or more, established a substantial need under Rule 15.1(g), Ariz. R. Crim. P., and Arizona case law, for the operating system software of the Intoxilyzer 8000 breath-testing equipment and in ordering petitioner State of Arizona to disclose the software to the defendants?
