Deadline fast approaching for the 2002-003 FAFSA: In order to meet eligibility for financial aid for next school year, and to be considered for need-based scholarships and possible university grants, you must file for FAFSA no later than Valentine's Day, February 14, 2002, to insure meeting the priority deadline of application and processing of March 1, 2002. All graduate students are required to complete the FAFSA online. The web address is <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>. If you still have your government pin number from last year, then you only need to file a 2002-03 renewal and just update last year's information. Estimate if you have not filed your income tax return and then you can go back and update the information after you have filed your taxes and the priority date will not change. If you have lost your pin, you can obtain one by first going to <http://www.pin.ed.gov>. If you encounter any difficulty in applying for the FAFSA or your pin, there is an extra computer in the Financial Services office, Room 118-C, where Kim Marlow can assist you, or you can contact her by e-mail or phone with questions.
